



LOOK OUT FOR

- If anyone makes a joke about you, calls you names, threatens or bullies you because you're not the same as them, they are discriminating against you. You may also feel that you are being unfairly treated because of your sex, race, age or for other reasons.
- In the UK there are laws to protect you. For example: Disability Discrimination Act, Race Relations Act and Sex Discrimination Act.



WHAT NEXT

- Try to see differences in people as a positive thing, and not something to be suspicious or scared of.
- Learn as much as you can about people as individuals. Knowing about different cultures, disabilities, sexualities and views can help you see past the label, and appreciate the human being.
- If you believe you are being discriminated against, don't suffer in silence. Speak to someone you trust e.g. a Youth Connexions Personal Adviser or call into your nearest One Stop Shop - see below for channelmogo.
- If you believe you are being discriminated against, keep a note of what happened and speak to someone you trust.
